Chairman's Message FROM WHERE I SIT

The Chinese have an expression; "May you live in interesting times". And I think it applies to Heritage London Foundation of late. Grosvenor Lodge and Elsie Perrin Williams Estate have been exceedingly well cared for by the City of London and our staff. The Estate has received considerable effort in the restoration of all the windows, particularly including the large lead glass window in the Great Hall, new copper eaves troughs, replacement of old knob and tube wiring with modern wiring and switches, upgrade to the lower floor washrooms and entrance ramp to improve handicap access. The Lodge now sports a new roof and the Property Committee and staff are sprucing up the trim with fresh paint.

We decided to accept the proposal made to us by one of our major caterers. They asked for the permission to become the exclusive caterer at the properties, In exchange, they provided some guarantees on the business we would do together and a donation of money for this privilege; an idea we felt was worth trying. This collaboration would begin in 2011. We intend to try the idea for 3 years and may renew if it shows to be beneficial. This comes at a time when we are having difficulties "making ends meet", therefore we hope it will be beneficial to both organizations.

We held another successful ACO-HLF Heritage Awards event in February where we recognized several private projects; residential, commercial and outstanding contributions to London's built heritage by Maggie Whalley, John Lutman and the reporting and editorial staff of the London Free Press.

At the AGM we regretfully said farewell to Mary Jane MacKenzie, a truly enthusiastic supporter of our work and Secretary to the Board for the past 3

years. We will miss her wisdom and the ease with which she helped us face some obstacles. At the same meeting we welcomed, actually welcomed back, Vaino Einola. Vaino had left the Board about 4 years ago due to a busy schedule and we are happy to have his creative ideas, excellent business experience and knowledge of HLF back with us. He has quickly gotten active on the Board by taking on the challenges of the Treasurer's position.

I think one of the most significant ventures we have initiated recently is the project to save the Old Antiquities Shoppe at 129-131 Wellington Street. It is a truly unique adventure for us. This collaborative effort with our partners, Pathways Skill Development and Placement with their Board and Executive Director, Paul Hubert, will not only result in saving this valuable heritage asset but may establish a roadmap for similar future projects.

I am blessed to have a wonderful Board of directors who bring wide experience, creative ideas and true effort to the work we do, both on the hospitality side of the organization and on heritage preservation projects. We, thankfully, are supported by terrific staff, both full and part time, under the great leadership of Jan Dickinson. We absolutely could not be as successful as we are without them.

Save the Red Antiquities Building-SRAB

We are all getting used to this acronym and the only problem is that it does not roll easily off the tongue. That being said we are so delighted with the progress made to date and wish to share with our members the current state of things. Back in the fall when we at HLF decided to partner with some ACO members to try and save the Red Antiquities Shoppe building we were taking a first step that was mandated by our revised Strategic Plan. The Plan states that we should be more proactive in the Heritage Field and try to use our resources and contacts to actually save a building or two rather than just moaning when one is torn down.

The committee, which is a subcommittee of HLF, has ACO and other members and is called the SRAB Committee.

Unfortunately Heritage just doesn't seem to have the urgent need that is commanded by many other charitable undertakings. Health issues, poverty issues issues, educational and environmental issues all seem to be so much higher on people's radar, and rightly so. We therefore hit a roadblock before we even really got started and that was a dire lack of funds. Buoyed by the generosity of many heritage enthusiasts such as yourself we offered to purchase the building, and tried hard

over several months to raise enough to cover the asking price, but this was not to be.

When in need ask! We needed, and by great good fortune we found, а partner. This partnership was made in heaven as it provides two disparate groups with the opportunity


to do something extraordinary that suits each organization's mandate. The partner we found is called Pathways Skills and Development. They are a not-for-profit organization that provides training and retraining for people who have lost their jobs. Under the agreement reached with HLF and SRAB, Pathways will actually purchase the building and will use the renovation of the structure as a training scheme for people in many different trades. There will be so many opportunities for learning on this job that it is a very exciting project. The

idea is to purchase the Red Antiquities Shoppe, render the building safe, and then renovate it to code while maintaining the exterior heritage

features. When this is done the building will be sold.

Pathways has a bigger bank balance than HLF but that does not meant that we can sit back and let them take on the full financial burden for this project, The HLF Board has undertaken to try and raise \$100,000 towards the cost of renovating

the building and we now have to start some very heavy duty fundraising indeed. For many of you reading this you will be able and willing to reach for your cheque book once again, but for others it will not be possible to make a donation just yet. We do urge you all to look out for events that will be geared towards fundraising for SRAB, but as you do so please do not forget that HLF is an organization that also needs ongoing financial support if it is to continue to function as a voice for the preservation of London's built heritage.

Property Committee Report

The Property Committee has had a much quieter year this year but there have still been major tasks undertaken at the house at **EPWE.** The City of London has undertaken some very necessary renovations. These include completely redoing the downstairs washrooms to render them fully accessible. They do look wonderful and the new exterior ramp is more elegant than the previous one. New wiring to replace the old "knob and tube" has been installed, and we now have splendid new copper eavestroughs (not cheap!). The most recent job was to remove and repair the large perpendicular-style window in the Great Room, which had bowed and was becoming a liability. Anxious moments occurred when we were not sure if this renovation would be done in time for the spring season's first bookings. The staff is now able to relax a bit as the window is now back in its place and does look lovely - and safethey have all been so patient with all the dust which accumulates every time a renovation is undertaken, and indeed we are all grateful to Jan, Krista and Lynn for their endurance.

We are delighted that the Infrastructure money from the Federal Government came through and enabled these very expensive repairs to be done.

The **gazebo** is now at the design stage but we still need more funds if we are to complete it this year. We hope very much that the splendid architect's drawings will be unveiled at the upcoming Gatsby Gala on July 14th. Brad Skinner of Skinner and Skinner is

the architect who has been asked to come up with a design that echoes the original gazebo that graced the grounds in Elsie's day. It has to be larger than the original to accommodate wedding parties and also has to be very durable as it is in a public park, so these are design constraints that Mr. Skinner has to work with.

The **Grosvenor Lodge** roof has been re-shingled and there is some maintenance work currently being done on the verandah. It is our intention to address the issue of grounds maintenance at the Lodge and to try and improve its plantings to make it even more attractive as a venue to visit. Ron Benner does an amazing job of keeping the potager looking magnificent, planted with many species native to the Americas. This year we are also fortunate to have the help of Mackenzie Smith who is doing a great job of edging beds and helping to plant the annuals, but he and Ron need help if we are to make the whole garden as lovely. As before, we are looking for gardening enthusiasts to help with some of the preparing of beds, pruning and planting that need to be done.

The annual house inspection will take place in early July and the Property Committee will be looking keenly at both properties, inside and out, to make sure that they are looking their best.
